

Many Norwegian folk costumes incorporates Hardanger work to decorate the linen apron or the long-sleeved linen under shirt. 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The Lexington Chamber Chorale: Music from the Land of the Midnight Sun

The evening of Saturday February 6th was dark, cold and damp. My friend Beth and I hurried from the car across the parking lot into the warm and bright Central Baptist Church on Wilson Downing Road. We were running late; the small pieces of toast with Kentucky made dill spread and Canadian smoked salmon had taken much longer to prepare than expected. Beth had been carefully balancing the tray on her lap while I took all the shortcuts I know to get to the concert in time, carefully slowing down in the curves not to send canapés flying.

We rushed through the lobby, threw the tray onto a table in the large reception hall and squeezed by the choir in the cozy entrance in to a packed church hall. We had made it! As we passed the 31 member choir with accompanist, I noticed that they seemed relaxed and cheerfully expectant. They looked beautiful. The gentlemen wore black suits and the ladies were sparkling, all dressed in black with long-sleeved, black sequined blouses.

And so the concert began. The first song took full advantage of the wonderful acoustics of the Church. The choir lined up along the entire wall of the round hall and we were encapsulated in song. Director Dr. Gary Anderson explained that unfortunately, Gary Graden was still in Stockholm, recovering from pneumonia and that the program order has changed slightly. We did still get a fantastic treat in Anders Åstrand's and James Campbell's fantastic work on vibraphone and percussions.

The choir covered an impressively wide range of music. We were treated to old Swedish psalms and more modern music, both with and without accompany. Some songs, like Salve Regina (Jansson/Eriksson), were joyous and rocking like ocean waves. Other songs, like the breathlessly beautiful Pingst ("Lent" by Lindberg/Levertin) were more solemn and definitely brought tears to my eyes. SHSKY's own Ginny Bowles sang a couple of wonderful solos. She introduced "Den Blomstertid Nu Kommer" ("Now Comes the Time of Blooms") as the song that all Swedish students sing in church when the schools in Sweden close for the summer, before she sang the first verse in perfect Swedish. The entire choir joined her for the following two verses in equally beautifully pronounced Swedish.

The concert felt very short, but I am sure that it wasn't; we just enjoyed myself thoroughly and time flew by. After the last song, the performers got a well deserved standing ovation and the audience got treated to an encore; the Swedish Christmas song "Jul, Jul, Strålande Jul". After the concert we got to enjoy all kinds of treats while mingling with old and new friends. SHSKY got a great opportunity to represent Scandinavia thanks to Kristan Lenning, who coordinated SHSKY's participation as a concert sponsor and encouraged our members to bring Scandinavian dishes and to dress in Nordic folks costumes.

The ensemble's next concert is entitled "Magnificent Magnificats" and will be performed in collaboration with the Lexington Brass Band.

Ingredients

- 1/2 cup of sugar
- A little less than 2 sticks (7/8ths of a cup or 200 grams) of butter
- 1/3-1/2 vanilla pod + 1 tsp sugar (or 1 tsp of vanilla sugar)
- 2 cups of flour
 1 tsp baking powder
- raspberry jam



Ingredients

- ♦ 2¼ dl wheat flower
- 🕴 🛛 ¾ dI sugar
- 1 tbsp baking soda
- 🕴 1 tbsp vanilla sugar
- ♦ 1.5 stick butter
 - 1 egg
 - <u>Filling:</u>
- 🕨 ~1 cup raspberry jam

~ Hallongrottor ~ ("Raspberry Caves")

Directions

Start by mixing your dry ingredients together. Cut your butter into chunks and add them to the dry ingredients. Mix until the ingredients come together into a dough.

Roll into a loaf and cut the loaf into even slices. Roll each slice into a walnut-sized ball and place in a small cupcake form. Using your thumb, make a depression in each ball. Fill each depression with about a teaspoon of raspberry jam.

Bake at 400 degrees F for about 15 minutes or until browned.

~ Hallonrutor ~ ("Raspberry Squares")

Directions

Mix all the ingredients except the jam. You can use a food processor, but be careful to just mix the dough. Let rest in the fridge for about 20 min.

Set oven to 390 F. Dress bottom of pan in parchment paper. Roll out and press 3/4 of dough into a ~ 13×9 square inch pan. Spread the jam over the dough.

Roll out the rest of the dough and cut it into thin ribbons (a pizza cutter should work well). Place the ribbons diagonally on top of the jam to form a lattice pattern. Bake in the center of the oven for 15-20 minutes.

Cut into small squares while still warm.
