We have thought of remembering Denmark in April, and I found an interesting item in The Local, a Danish newspaper on line in English. What do you think was the Nordic status symbol in the Roman Iron Age from 1-325 CE? It turns out to be the goose. Hens and geese were unknown in Nordic countries, it seems, until introduced by the Romans. There was a custom in Rome of honoring the deceased with the gift of an animal, such as a hen or goose. Geese represented Juno who was married to

Jupiter, at the peak of Roman mythological hierarchy. Such animals were rare and highly esteemed in Denmark and have been found In high status tombs with other Roman objects as well!
