Ordinarily we would have celebrated Midsummer at my house in June. I do wish we could have done so. The risk of someone getting COVID 19 was too great. We have missed our meetings in April, May and June. We can only hope that we will be able to meet somehow in October and December. We are on a strange journey, but staying well is paramount!

Perhaps you have noticed that Norway, pop. approx. 5.368 million, has had a relatively low increase in the number of virus cases. Their first case was on February 26, and the first people infected, 56 cases by March 4, all had traveled abroad, mostly to Austria and Italy. When transmission was known to have started in Norway by March 10, the state imposed a lock-down on March 12 for 2 weeks. An intensive effort in testing began. A number of travel bans were imposed, and by April 6, the virus reproduction rate had dropped to .7 in the country. This indicated the virus was under control. Other nordic countries have done well, too. Denmark has 13,101 cases, Finland has 7,265, Iceland has 1880, and yet Sweden has 73,858. Sweden chose not to shut down, although postponing the soccer season and university instruction. People at risk were advised not to circulate. On their own, many businesses have allowed people to work at home; people are avoiding public transport, and some are keeping their children out of school. The death rate has gone up, and now gatherings of over 50 people are not allowed. With time, we will learn which approach is most effective.

Native to SW Asia, warmer parts of Europe and Africa, it winters in tropical Africa. It is often seen near water at evening, swooping back and forth to catch insects. It also feeds on the ground. Birders in Iceland and from abroad have come to see it! Isn't it nice to see that "normal life" goes on despite the pandemic. In fact, animals around the earth are taking over places that people have abandoned for the moment. Capybaras have been seen in South America lounging in family groups on the golf courses.
