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Scandinavian Heritage Society P.2

The Nobel Prizes are always inspiring. Each year Sweden and Norway confer awards in 6 areas: Medicine or Physiology, literature, Economics, Physics, Chemistry and work for Peace.Recipients receive a medal, a diploma and 10 million Swedish Krona, which is about 1.1 million dollars, divided if there are multiple winners. In **Medicine/Physiology**, the prize went to **Ardem Patapoutian** and **David Julius** for discoveries related to receptors for temperature and touch. This increases understanding of how the human nervous system senses various temperatures and other stimuli.

In **Physics**, the prize went to **Giorgio Parisi**, **Klaus Hasselmann** and **Syukuro Manabe** who have established a foundation of knowledge on climate and how humans influence it.

In **Chemistry**, the prize went to **Benjamin List and David W.C. MacMillan**, who created a tool to build molecules which will advance pharmaceutical research and is helpful to the environment.

In **Literature**, the prize went to **Abdulrazak Gurnah** for "his uncompromising and compassionate penetration of the effects of colonialism and the fate of the refugee in the gulf between cultures and continents." Born in Tanzania, he lives in Britain and is the first African to win the award in almost 20 years.

In **Economics**, the prize went to **David Card**, **Joshua D. Angrist** and **Guido W**. **Imbens** who have carried out research based on actually occurring events, such as whether an increase in the minimum wage has an impact on loss of jobs, and developed tools to facilitate this approach.

In **Peace**, the prize went to **Maria Ressa** and **Dmitri A. Muratov**, located in the Philippines and Russia, who are journalists dedicated to protection of freedom of expression and freedom of the press. They give courage new meaning!

The prizes will be delivered in December in the home countries of the honorees. The prizes are highly competitive. For example, there were 329 candidates for the Nobel Peace Prize made up of 234 individuals and 95 organizations. Note that names and nominators of candidates are protected for 50 years! There is a Norse settlement located in L'Anse aux Meadows, Newfoundland that now has been dated to 1021 C.E. The determination is based on dating discarded branches found at the site. According to the Smithsonian one can still see scars left on the tree sections left by iron blades! This means the Vikings were felling trees when they arrived after the earliest known crossing of the Atlantic. The Scientists were able to pinpoint the date by looking at tree rings which had evidence of a cosmic-ray event in 993 C.E. that left traces in the rings, and by counting the rings after that event. The article continues, the Viking sagas of Iceland suggest that the Vikings traveled on past Greenland which they abandoned to a place they called Vinland. In the 1960s, L'Anse aux Meadows verified the tale! One can visit this site where some reconstruction of sod and timber buildings has taken place. For more information you may wish to explore the Smithsonian article of October 20, 2021. By the way, in considering a trip there once, I was surprised to learn that from northern Maine, the site is still 1091 miles away! The Park is open from May 31 to October 1. For more information, visit https://www.pc.gc.ca>lhn-nhs.visit. This takes you to National Historic Sites in Canada. Then look for L'Anse aux Meadows.

Sweden has an Ice Hotel in Jukkasjarvi (2 dots over the 2d a).


Sweden's yuletide carbonated drink, Julmust, outsells Coca-Cola. (Also available at Easter.)


Sweden had a Pirate King, Eric XIII (14th century)
